A scarce print of a caricatured British soldier, with a pillbox hat with its strap under his nose and mutton-chop whiskers, peering down the Channel Tunnel through a telescope, fearing an invasion. He overlooks the tricolour French rats that have reached the shells of his howitzer. In 1875 an Act of Parliament authorised the Channel Tunnel Company to start trials and, using a rotary boring machine, a tunnel just over a mile long was dug from the bottom of Shakespeare Cliff. However public disapproval of this breach in England's natural defences caused political support to dry up. A month after this cartoon was published the project was abandoned. 'El Loro' (the Parrot) described itself as a 'Periodico Ilustrado Joco-Sério'.

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
